Highlights

Water for Haiti



Community service has always been a strong component of After-School All-Stars Atlanta. As a response to the earthquake in Haiti, our kids answered the call to service immediately. Students from all the schools made the decision to work together on their common goal of reaching out to the survivors of the earthquake. They organized a charity drive in which they collected bottled water. From the end of January to the beginning of February, 106 cases of water bottles have been donated. The After-School All-Stars staff picked up the water bottles and dropped them off to Hosea Feed The Hungry & Homeless. They will be shipping the donations to Haiti. After-School All-Stars met the students challenge by doubling the amount of donated water. The students 106 cases became 212! Long Middle School decided to extend the water drive to the end of

February and provided an additional 80 cases, which resulted in 292 total cases. We applied our students for their continuous efforts to promote civic engagement. Elizabeth Omilani, Executive Director of Hosea Feed The Hungry and Homeless, wrote a letter of gratitude to After-School All-Stars for the donations that they received.
