Activities

All-Stars Kick-Offs

The schools served by Atlanta After-School All-Stars are getting ready for another year of excitement. The Mighty Mustangs of Parks Middle School kicked off the year with a series of field day activities such as rope climbing, balloon pumping, and basketball tossing, while Harper-Archer Middle School kicked off the year with basketball. This year is also the year that Atlanta After-School All-Stars has been introduced to a program called KidTrax, which is a tool that will help the schools evaluate their programs. Moreover, this year the schools are working in stronger collaboration with each other, in addition to the collaboration they've built with Georgia State University over the years. Starting January, the After-School All-Stars program will be expanding its operations with programs in Turner Middle School and Long Middle School. There is a lot to look forward to.



Field Trips

Field trips play an integral role in the learning experiences for participants of the After-School All-Stars program. This Fall, the ladies of Coretta Scott King went to the Ferst Center for the Arts to watch the musical group Arrested Development play music based on African-American History. Students from Coretta Scott King and Harper–Archer participated in a program called Dialog In The Dark, a journey in which the students went through darkened galleries to experience what it is like to rely less on the sense of sight and more on the non-visual senses. Also, Carson Middle School went on a field trip to the Auburn Avenue Library to see different styles of clothing that African-American women wore throughout 1887-1950. Students from Harper-Archer Middle School went to The High Museum of



Art and received tickets to go to Disney On Ice. The students from Parks Middle School went on field trips to Clark Atlanta University and the Federal Reserve Bank, while Brown Middle School students went to Metro Skates. Many of the schools got a chance to see the Urban Nutcracker. Overall, the kids had a spectacular time at all of the field trips.

Enrichment

After-School All-Stars has always provided enrichment activities for the students that it serves, and this Fall, the program has been bigger than ever. Participants of After-School All-Stars had an opportunity to participate in clinics like nutrition, martial arts, and cosmetology. Furthermore, Volunteers from Bank of America taught financial literacy classes on checking and savings at King Middle School and Brown through a program called Operation HOPE. After-School All-Stars has partnered with Dark Horse Comics to help students at Carson, King, and B.E.S.T. create their own comic books, focusing on a theme of creating a better world. Other activities included robotics, dance, and poetry. Also, the students from Carson Middle School participated in a competition sponsored by Nintendo



in which they played Nintendo Wii games to win prizes. Students at Brown also had a video game competition, though this one involved playing Dance Dance Revolution. Likewise, Parks Middle School competed in a chess tournament against Long Middle School, in which the Mighty Mustangs placed 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. With two new schools joining the After-School All-Stars family in the spring, the possibilities for enrichment are endless!

Cultural Exchange

After-School All-Stars strives to expose its students to unique experiences, and this month provided participants of the program a "cultural exchange." Students from Lincoln House School, a school in South Korea, came to America to experience a unique cultural enrichment opportunity, so After-School All-Stars was ready to oblige. They put on Korean dance performances in front of the Mighty Mustangs of Parks Middle School, including a traditional Korean dance and modern style. Furthermore, a South American dance routine and musical performances with a violin and flute took place. Likewise, students from Parks Middle School put on a cheerleading performance to show the students from Lincoln House School, as the students have not seen cheerleading in Korea. Everybody took time to reflect on this wonderful learning experience, as students from both schools ate together and



pursued an international penpal experience for when the students return to South Korea. Both sets of students are looking forward to continuing their extraordinary friendships.







Rock The Vote

With elections taking place this Fall, After-School All-Stars took an active role in motivating parents of students to become politically active in advocating for policymakers to increase funding for after-school programs. The staff of Parks Middle School hosted a voter registration drive for parents. In addition, Carson Middle School engaged its students in the National Student Mock Elections, a program in which the students learned about voting for individual candidates for President, Congress, and some other political positions. The other schools also participated in the mock elections. Moreover, an event called the Afterschool Rally, which was co-organized by the Georgia Afterschool Investment Council and the Georgia Parent Teacher Association, took place at the Georgia State Capitol Building. Being a key provider of after-school programs for middle school students, After-School All-Stars attended this event. During this event, parents, students, and teachers voiced their support for increased funding toward after-school programs. A speech was delivered by House of Representatives member Howard Maxwell, who supports after-school programs because funds allocated to them result in less money allocated toward incarceration and teen childbearing costs, while graduation rates will rise. Another reason why Howard Maxwell supports after-school programs is because they allow students to learn valuable life skills through various enrichment activities.

Lights On

Celebrations

This Fall After-School All-Stars participated in Lights On Afterschool, an event in which all the schools celebrated the success of after-school programs. Last year it took place in Brown Middle School, and students from each of the schools showcased their talents through drum performances, dance, and other activities. This year each school had their own Lights On Celebration, consisting of many different activities. Parks Middle School celebrated with

activities such as face painting, obstacle courses, and balloon pumping. The students of Brown put on artistic performances, while Harper-Archer celebrated by having the kids dance. The rest of the schools celebrated Lights On by having ice cream socials. Also, all the schools had raffles in which students were eligible to receive book bags with school supplies inside, courtesy of United Way and the law firm of Kilpatrick Stockton LLP.





Reading Project

This Fall the schools of the After-School All-Stars program participated in a service-learning initiative in which they engaged the middle school students in reading to elementary school students. Books were donated by Kirk

Postmanur, Co-Chairperson of Atlanta After-School All-Stars. The books were distributed to each of the seven schools, all representing a variety of interests. The Mustangs of Parks Middle School, for example, read to Gideon Elementary School students, who also took part in the series of activities during the Lights On events. Perhaps this reading project will recruit some elementary school students as future All-Stars participants.

Meals are common events for the After-School All-Stars families to reflect on and celebrate their accomplishments. The students at B.E.S.T. celebrated the After-School All-Stars program with a family night at the school while Parks held breakfast and dinner events at the school for parents called "Breakfast On The Go," and "Let's Start Parenting." They also had a family night event at the Golden Corral, as well as a breakfast event in which they invited the grandparents of the students to come to the





school. The ladies of Coretta Scott King and the gentlemen of the B.E.S.T. Academy celebrated Halloween with a Fall Festival and Dance that DJ 4Real chaperoned. This event's theme was "The Enhancement and Empowerment of the Future Leaders of Tomorrow. The kids played games, received prizes, and ate some hot dogs. Harper-Archer, as well, had a Halloween party, providing its students with special treats. Doesn't reading about all of this make you hungry?

Giving Back

Sports Talk

As a long-time partner of After-School All-Stars, the Atlanta Falcons Youth Foundation has provided a lot of support to the program in the Fall. The Atlanta Falcons Youth Foundation strongly believes in the importance of motivating youth to engage in regular exercise, as they have generously donated a HOPSports Training System, which offers a series of videos for kids and their parents to learn workout routines. The program was introduced to the After-School All-Stars during the Mustang Summer Academy 2008, which took place at Parks Middle School. This training program was so popular that the use of it has been extended for the entire year. Exercises such as breakdancing, martial arts, yoga, and Pilates were offered through this innovative training program. In addition, the Atlanta Falcons Youth Foundation, in partnership with Atlanta-based NetMoves, donated tickets to the schools served by After-School All-Stars so that the students, as well as the staff of the schools, were able to watch the Falcons games. Moreover, the Atlanta Falcons Youth Foundation contributed iersevs to the schools so that the students can wear them. Dr. Walt Thompson: Executive Director

Dr. Thompson is an exercise physiology professor in the Department of Kinesiology and Health at Georgia State University. In addition, he serves as a professor in the College of Health and Human Sciences for the Division of Nutrition, School of Allied Health Professions. He advises undergraduate and graduate students as well as students who are working on their doctoral degrees, and he has published 8 books and numerous scientific presentations. He currently writes grant proposals to ensure that adequate funding sustains the After-School All-Stars program for the schools that the program serves.
