# **Programs**

### We're Growing

After-School All-Stars has been growing continuously for years and this year has been no exception. Two new schools, Price Middle School and Young Middle School, have been added to our roster of sites. Both of these schools kicked off the year with family night events at which parents and students found out what After-School All-Stars is all about. The kids have already signed up for the activities that were offered to them. The students at Price Middle School participated in intramurals such as football, soccer, cheerleading, and track. Moreover, they were involved with enrichment activities ranging from debate and sewing to nutrition, hip-hop history, and board games. Young Middle School allowed its chefs to join the



nutrition class so they could learn how to prepare healthy snacks. In addition, the kids at Young Middle School took part in a new program called CEO (Career Exploration Opportunities), which was funded by a grant from the MetLife Foundation. This new initiative engaged students in learning about topics such as credit cards, mortgages, and entrepreneurship. They did this through field trips to businesses and interviews with community leaders. We are excited about the addition of these new schools, along with the CEO program, which has also been launched at our other schools.

#### **Enrichment**

So much has been going on this winter for the students we serve. The ladies at Coretta Scott King Women's Academy utilized their technical skills through the robotics program and explored character education through the True Sparks program, which allowed them to participate in discussion about characters in movies like "To Kill A Mocking Bird" and "Akeelah And The Bee." Students of King Middle School and Coan Middle School engaged in pate in outdoor adventure programs through Mosiah's Roots, which gave them a chance to learn about pitching tents, navigating with a compass, and other wilderness survival tactics. The Brown Middle School Dolphins hosted a Charm School Fashion Show to show the importance of wearing clothes that are appropriate and trendy, and the girls at Coretta Scott King Women's Academy participated in arts and crafts. In addition, the Eagle Drum Line of B.E.S.T. displayed their musical talents with bass, snare, and tenor drums while the Hip Hop Studio allowed the kids at Coan Middle School to write lyrics and tracks for public service announcements. Furthermore, the Jaguars of Harper-Archer Middle School enhanced their reading skills through the Book Club and participated in friendly competition during Board Game Fridays. The Sandy Springs Stallions brought out their creative sides and learned about the fields of film and television in the Film Makers Club, the students at Sylvan Hills Middle School collected non-perishable food items for families living in homeless shelters, and the kids residing at City of Refuge were taught African drumming. Also, Gilbert House's kids created Valentine heart flower bouquets for their mothers and neckties for fathers. The children at South Bend learned about finances through Monopoly Math and J.D. Sims allowed its students to learn the arts of Ballet, Jazz, and Capoeira through Dance Canvas. With all these activities, no wonder After-School All-Stars has set a record of 2700 students this season.







# **Highlights**

### **MLK Day Of Service**

Martin Luther King Jr's legacy of service has influenced millions around the world and the All-Stars kids have chosen to honor his legacy with a day of civic engagement. Through a partnership with Home Depot, the Corporation for National and Community Service, and the Global Peace Festival Foundation, King Middle School and Sylvan Hills Middle School observed this national day of service with several community projects. The students and families decorated the schools with portraits and quotes of Dr. King, put together care packages for veterans through the Veteran Empowerment Organization, and created signage for community gardens. In addition, they wrote holiday cards for a children's hospital and distributed food and clothes for veterans at the National Kidney Foundation. Other programs that took place included workshops in stress management and financial literacy, as well as a voter registration and a health fair. There were many organizations that collaborated to make this day successful, including Morehouse College, Chase Bank, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Pi Alpha Omega, and Clark Atlanta University. After the projects, the kids and their families went to watch the Hawks game, courtesy of FOX Sports. This was indeed a spectacular day and the students, as well as their families, should be commended for the impact they made in for the community.







#### **Health Programs**



Health activities play a key role in After-School All-Stars. Price Middle School offered its kids programs like cheerleading, the athletes at King Middle School

took part in track & field, and Brown Middle School's students took part in step team and softball. The boys at B.E.S.T. Academy participated in basketball, City of Refuge's children were involved in "Soccer In The Streets," and Coan Middle School gave its kids a chance to advocate for public health through Citizen Wellness. Students from all the sites grew produce items such as pears, blueberries, and apples through the organic gardens. In addition, they prepared healthy snacks during the nutrition clinics. Kudos to the All-Stars kids!

## **Community Service**



There is no limit to the good heart of the the After-School All-Stars students. The Young Middle School students put together a donation drive to raise funds for the *Against Malaria Foundation* on behalf of families

in Sub-Saharan Africa. The kids organized this fundraiser by advertising to the school, creating collection bins in the homerooms, and determining the charity of choice. In 3 weeks they raised \$436 to purchase 87 mosquito nets. Once the money is received by the foundation, they will indicate exactly where in Africa the nets will be sent. These kids should be commended for their hard work and the communities in Sub-Saharan Africa will appreciate this gesture too. As a larger number of students get involved in After-School All-Stars, more kids will serve the community.

# **Angel Tree Project**



Last year After-School All-Stars and the Georgia State University College of Education teamed up to provide holiday gifts to children that reside at the City of Refuge. After the initial success of this initiative we continued this important project. In the lobby of the College of Education at Georgia State University, there was a tree we called our "Angel Tree."





Erected by the staff After-School All-Stars, on the tree were the names of children living with their mothers at the City of Refuge. The City of Refuge provides transitional housing for homeless women and their children. The names of the children were accompanied by the children's "wish list" for the holidays. Most of these children are elementary aged or middle school aged and all of them are in the After-School All-Stars program. City of Refuge hosted the 2nd annual Angel Tree Project on December 16, 2011. Students, faculty, and staff from the GSU College of Education all pitched in to provide up to 150 gifts to the kids that reside there. Presents consisted of items such as bikes, sports

equipment, dolls, Nooks, and MP3 players. These contributions were passed out after the children and their families quenched their hunger with delicious meals. The residents also sang Christmas carols around a piano that played harmonious music, composed by volunteer music instructor Nada Long. Likewise, as a result of a service-learning project organized by the Sandy Springs Middle School Stallions, the mothers of the kids received donations of much needed toiletry bags. An added bonus was the opportunity for each child to get his or her own picture taken with Santa Claus. Overall, the night was a complete success, as the residents were extremely appreciative of the generosity that was shown to them and enjoyed their holiday season.
